# A. Proclamations

A. Proclamation to Pinole Valley High School in recognition of its 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Mayor Long presented a proclamation to Principal, Kibby Kleiman of Pinole Valley High School (PVHS) recognizing their 50<sup>th</sup> year anniversary. Principal Kleiman thanked the Council for the recognition and spoke in remembrance of Coach Jerry Deuker who began his career with PVHS in 1967 and ran a successful athletic program for students for 37 years. A. Quarterly WPCP Project Update by Project Manager Mike Warriner

Project Manager Mike Warriner provided an update to the Council on the status of the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant Upgrade Project. He stated that the structures are 95% complete with active phases of construction within budget. The project is on schedule for completion on October 28, 2018 and final completion date of December 26, 2018. Mayor Long stated that at this time local hires are at about 25% Pinole and Hercules residents.

#### 10. NEW BUSINESS

A. Confirm the City Manager's Authority to Provide Management Merit Increases Already Budgeted in FY 17/18, per SB 1436

[Action: Approve Resolution Per Staff Recommendation (Fitzer)]

City Manager Fitzer presented the report and stated that in accordance with the new legislation, SB 1436, changes to the management employee's salaries and benefits must now be "announced" at a public meeting before the final approval.

The following speaker addressed the Council,

<u>Vincent Wells</u>, representative of Local 1230, addressed Council to express his concern about management increases of approximately \$40k with combined merit and COLA increases. He requested that Council consider giving members of Local 1230 a substantial salary increase as given to management staff.

Mayor Long questioned management increases and clarification of merit vs. step increases. City Manager Fitzer stated that step increases are merit based increases. She stated that management employees receive the compensation of the AFSCME bargaining unit. City Manager Fitzer will reach out to Mr. Wells to further discuss his concerns and will provide Council a follow up with the outcome of the discussion.

B. Consider Letter of Support for SB 231 Regarding Stormwater Funding Options [Action: Approve Authorization of Signature by Minute Order (T. Miller)]

Community Development Director/City Engineer Tamara Miller presented the report and requested Council's support in approving the draft letter of support for SB231 regarding storm water funding options. This bill would amend definition of "sewer" in the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act to include storm water drainage systems. This change would allow local governments to finance storm water projects using the existing transparency and accountability requirements that currently exist under Proposition 218. Council asked questions and received responses.

Councilmember Swearingen reminded members of the community that Dumpster Day is exclusive to residents of Pinole; ID will be required.
